This Lent, the Mini Vinnies have taken part in a Cafod charity event. There were many different stalls like bake stalls, Hama bead creations, charm bracelets and necklaces and a raffle. We have thoroughly enjoyed this and would love to do many more events like it. Knowing now that people in Zambia have hopefully enough money to buy equipment for fishing and be taught a life skill is fabulous!

We also had a non-school uniform day and people brought in money for Cafod too! We have raised £1,288.23. This was split between a non-uniform day which raised £514.49 and the Year 6 stalls which raised £773.74.

We also have been attending Stations of the Cross, around the field. Mr Lord and Mr Coleman had helpfully made crosses to carry and place around the field. Mrs Fau-Goodwin, Mrs Harding and Deacon Peter led us around the Stations of the Cross and helped us understand the difficult situations at the stations. There were 14 stations in total and for each one we paid our respect and prayed. It was a very emotional and moving experience that we took part in. During the stations, what we saw in our hearts showed us how the people at the crucifixion of Jesus felt, and made us feel the same way too. We would love for this to happen again next Lent.

Grace said, "I was relaxed as well as feeling how Jesus and his followers would have felt."

Halle thought, "I felt peaceful but I knew that God was with Jesus and thought; because of how powerful He was and is, he would defeat death and rise again."

Zoe said, "It was very emotional for me, as Jesus dying was very sad, but throughout the stations, I learnt that He died so that we could live."

In addition to these events we have also enjoyed taking part in the lunchtime Rosary Club led by Deacon Peter and Mrs Wright. We prayed the Rosary and were given our own Rosary beads to keep by Deacon Peter.

As Mini Vinnies, we are very proud of the work we have done to help those less-fortunate than us.

Mini Vinnies at St Clement's in Runcorn are putting their faith into ACTION!


With their Co-ordinator Mrs Attwood they have been looking at the key words in their school Mission Statement.

St Elizabeth's Wythenshawe **Events**

The Mini Vinnies group at St Elizabeth's Primary school, Wythenshawe have run a number of successful events this term.

During Lent they held a Hunger Lunch to support the CAFOD Lent appeal *Turn little Fish into Big Fish*. Staff and parishioners received a soup lunch in return for their donations.

Recently the Mini Vinnie's have focused on the homeless in our community and have made two large donations to The Copperdale Trust Homeless Shelter, Wythenshawe.

During Advent they collected socks, hats and scarves which helped people visiting the shelter during the cold months.

Another project, Brew and A Biscuit, involved making up insulated cups with sugar, coffee/tea, biscuits and milk. They sold these cups for £1 but instead of giving them to the buyer, they signed their name on a tag which was then put on a cup and given to a homeless person through the Copperdale Trust.

The Mini Vinnie's collected purple toiletries during Lent for the Wythenshawe Food Bank, as well as collecting towels to donate to the Copperdale Trust Homeless Shelter.

For Valentine's Day the Mini Vinnies made paper flowers and gave these with bars of chocolate wrapped in scriptures about love to staff and students at school.

And an answer for each prayer





During the trialling of the Mini Vinnie Programme in the Shrewsbury Diocese in 2010 I was visiting Our Lady & St Edward's Catholic Primary school in Birkenhead.

Whilst speaking with the Headteacher, Mrs McGunnigall she introduced me to a teacher Emily Rainsford whom she thought would make a very good Mini Vinnie Coordinator.

During my conversation with Emily I mentioned that the Mini Vinnie programme would benefit from having its own song. One of Emily's duties at the school was music and she very readily agreed to compose a song for us.

Shortly after she came to Runcorn with her guitar and together with a music teacher Luke Lewis from St Clement's Catholic Primary, Runcorn and their Mini Vinnie group recorded the song.

Emily kindly signed over the copyright to the song to the St Vincent de Paul Society to use as they see fit. A copy of the sheet music is enclosed in the Mini Vinnie resources pack for each new group, and is available on request.

Recently our National SVP Office in London has been approached by a school in Sydney, Australia - St Joachim, Lidcombe. They have a Mini Vinnie group and have asked for a copy of the sheet music so that their group can learn the Mini Vinnie song.

It was through liaising with our Australian colleagues in 2010 that the Mini Vinnie Programme was first introduced into schools in the Shrewsbury Diocese.

We have developed strong links and relationships with our fellow Vincentians in Australia, and learned a great deal from each other.

It would be lovely to think that by sharing our Mini Vinnie song with St Joachim's school in Lidcombe very soon "all" Mini Vinnies in Australia will be singing the same song as those across England and Wales! Happy singing Mini Vinnies!
