We are excited to announcement that we will be introducing a new phonics scheme to support the teaching and learning of early reading and phonics in our school. 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Parents will be receiving more information shortly about the scheme, the resources and the reading aspect. There will also be phonic information sessions for parents to attend. We are very impressed with the new scheme, and the new books and resources our children will enjoy. Our new scheme will ensure our children continue to acquire systematic phonic skills and apply them in their early reading and writing.

MINI VINNIES 'BE A SANTA TO A SENIOR'

The Mini Vinnies collaborated with the Year 6 Sports council in a whole school project for the local charity 'Home Instead'. The challenge was to resource and make as many Christmas cards for the 'Be a Santa to a Senior' appeal, to spread some festive cheer to the lonely, elderly and isolated in our community. The cards were collected last week from the Charity, who were delighted with the response of our school to this vital project.

#SHOW RACISM THE RED CARD

Following on from the work we have been doing in this area, we have included below information for parents from UNICEF about how to talk to your child about racism. Some parents worry about exposing their children to issues like racism and discrimination at an early age. Others shy away from talking about something they themselves don't feel comfortable discussing. Yet others, especially those who have experienced racism, simply do not have such choices.

























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Studies have shown that by age 5, children can show signs of racial bias, such as treating people from one racial group more favourably than the other. Ignoring or avoiding the topic isn't protecting children, it's leaving them exposed to bias that exists wherever we live. Children who encounter racism, can be left feeling lost while trying to understand why they are being treated a certain way, which in turn can impact their long-term development and well-being.

HOW TO TALK TO YOUR CHILD ABOUT RACISM

The way children understand the world evolves as they grow, but it's never too late to talk to them about equality and racism. Here are some age-appropriate ways to start that conversation and explain that racism is always wrong:

UNDER 5 YEARS

At this age, children may begin to notice and point out differences in people they see around them. As a parent, you have the opportunity to gently lay the foundation of their worldview.

Recognise and celebrate differences – If your child asks about someone's skin colour, you can use it as an opportunity to acknowledge that people do indeed look different, but to point out things we have in common. You could say, "We are all human, but we are all unique, isn't that amazing!"

6-11 YEARS

Children this age are better at talking about their feelings and are eager for answers. They are also becoming more exposed to information they may find hard to process. Start by understanding what they know.

Discuss the media together – social media and the internet may be one of your children's main sources of information. Show interest in what they are reading and the conversations they are having online.

HOW YOU CAN HELP

Parents are children's introduction to the world. What they see you do is as important as what they hear you say. Take every opportunity to challenge racism, demonstrate kindness and stand up for every person's right to be treated with dignity and respect.
